### 2016 - 2017

Oana David received her Ph.D. in 2016 in Linguistics from University of California, Berkeley, one MS in 2010 in Linguistics and Philology and another in 2009 in Japanese Studies, both from Oxford University, and received her BA in Anthropology and Japanese Language & Literature from Boston University in 2003. While at UCM, Dr. David will be conducting research on computational and experimental approaches to the study of metaphor in communications about immigration, climate change, disease and other societal challenges.

Mark Fleming received his Ph.D. in 2015 in Medical Anthropology from University of California, San Francisco and Berkeley, his MS in 2008 in Sociology from University of Wisconsin, Madison, and his BA in 2004 in Biology from Oberlin College.
